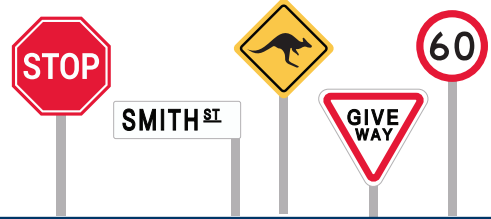


Fun Tips from Let's Count

Street signs for example come in different shapes. Why not ask your child to describe the shapes they can see and count the sides?

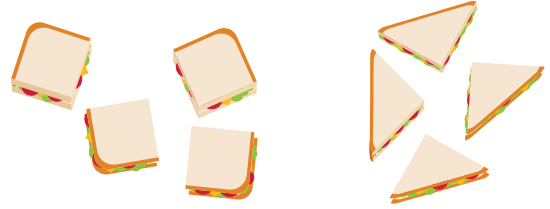


In the Kitchen

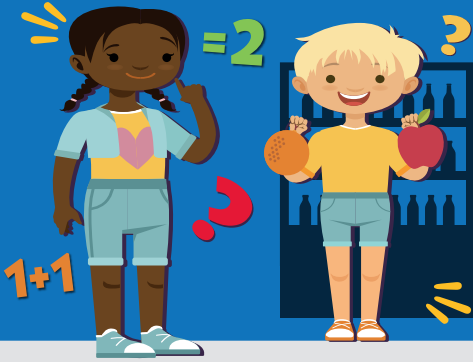
At home and preparing food can be a great way to talk about shapes.

Try it for yourself!

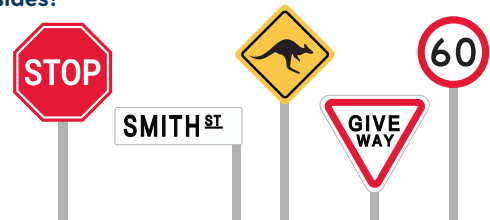
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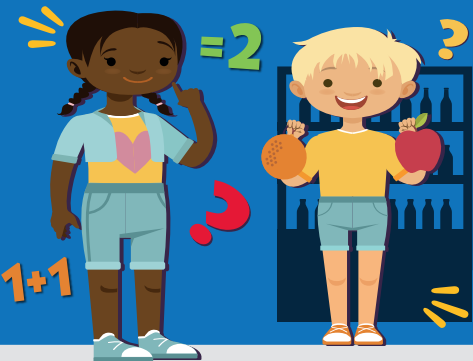
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
