Our range of learning and mentoring support programs help your child build skills, knowledge, motivation, self-belief and positive relationships.

This support can help your child or children stay engaged with school, and develop rewarding career pathways for life after school.

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Future Seekers


Year 7-8 students

Future Seekers is an interactive program that introduces your child to the world of work. It gives them information about work skills and jobs of the future.

What does Future Seekers involve?

Your child will attend six to seven one-hour sessions during school hours. In these sessions, they'll learn more about working life in a fun, imaginative and interactive setting. The program is run by a trained facilitator.

student2student

Year 7-8 students

Our student2student program matches students who have reading difficulties with an older student buddy who helps and encourages them with their reading.

What does student2student involve?

Your child and buddy receive a book pack from The Smith Family or a login for an online library, Chatty Kids. Their reading buddy contacts your child via phone or Chatty Kids two or three times a week for at least 20 minutes, over 18 weeks. Your child reads to their buddy, who uses the skills learnt in training to assist them with their reading and offers encouragement and praise. Their buddy keeps a simple record of each phone call and reports progress to a volunteer supervisor fortnightly.

Who is eligible?

 Year 7-8 students up to 4 years behind in reading


Your child can apply in Terms 1 and 2 of the school year.

Career Activities



Career Activities are designed to support your child as they explore career and further study options beyond school.

What do Career Activities involve?

Career Activities can take place at school, or in the community. Each activity is designed to provide your child with the necessary skills and knowledge they need to help them create plans for their post-school pathways.

Did you know?

Young people who can recall four or more structured Career Activities across their school life are five times less likely to be unemployed or disengaged from education or training as a young adult.*



Learning Clubs

Year 7-12 students

Your child will attend an out-of-school hours learning club, designed to offer your child extra learning support that will have a positive impact in their everyday school life.

What do Learning Clubs involve?

Your child will attend a one-hour session per week for 18 weeks outside school hours, either at school or a local community venue.

Learning Clubs provide things like:

Futurepreneurs Inspire

Year 8-10 students



Futurepreneurs is an exciting program that introduces your child to the business world and the tools to empower them to be more adaptable and employable.

What does Futurepreneurs involve?

Your child will attend one – two workshops totalling 5 hours, where as a team they will:

- Learn about design thinking
- Solve a problem using this design thinking
- Design a 2D prototype, and pitch their idea

Activities can be completed online or in a printable PDF workbook.

To further their business-focused learning, students can also attend the Futurepreneurs Ignite program.

Early exposure to entrepreneurship benefits all students. It helps expand the possibilities for their futures by challenging them to think outside the box and use their strengths in new ways.*



Futurepreneurs Ignite

Year 8-10 students



Futurepreneurs Ignite helps provide broader awareness of future career pathways and greater workforce exposure, focused on preparing students to be adaptable and employable in the future.

What does Futurepreneurs involve?

Your child will attend 10 1-hour sessions at school, where as a team they will:

- Learn about design thinking
- Identify and solve a problem using this design thinking
- Design either a 2D prototype and pitch their idea or create a product and sell it

Activities can be completed online or in a printable PDF workbook.

SmArts

Year 8-12 students with an interest in the arts



SmArts is a program for children who are interested in creative industries and arts. Your child will be encouraged to use their imagination and creative skills. It also gives them practical information about pursuing a career in the arts.

What does SmArts involve?

Your child will attend SmArts for a minimum of 20 hours. Sessions are held at school or a community venue.

During the sessions, your child will learn more about creative industries and be connected with professionals to get a real sense of a creative career. "The best thing about SmArts was hearing from people who are in the arts field/industry and hearing their story and how they ended up where they are. Listening to their advice, what opportunities they took to get them where they are today."

iTrack

Year 9-11 students

iTrack provides your child with access to online mentoring sessions with a trained and supportive adult mentor, who'll offer advice and encouragement for their post-school plans.

What does iTrack involve?

Once a week, your child will chat online with their mentor, who is a trained Smith Family volunteer. Chats are scheduled during school hours or at home after school. Over the 18-week program, your child and their mentor will work together on things like:

- Selecting school subjects
- Study skills
- Deciding on what to do next
- Writing a resume
- General career guidance

"When I was in Year 10 I was missing that career guidance. My mentor was really helpful in that sort of direction. The more you talk to them, the more you find out you can learn."

Exploring Educational Pathways (EEP)

Exploring Educational Pathways is a career activity designed to help educate your child about their higher education opportunities.

What does Exploring Educational Pathways involve?

Your child will attend activities at a university and TAFE over two days.

These activities help them understand the different educational pathways they might wish to take.

Ready for Work



Ready for Work will give your child tailored student support through one-on-one meetings with a career coach.

What does Ready for Work involve?

Your child will attend between four and six one-on-one sessions with a career coach. These sessions are held fortnightly. Their career coach will help them explore their next steps in education and careers and the best way to approach this.

Who is eligible?

Your child must be based in VIC, NSW, and SA in Year 9-12 and still exploring their next steps in their academic and/or career space.

"Career coaching definitely opens up your pathways and skills, and helps you understand what it's like in the future. I definitely recommend this program to kids who don't know what they want to do going forward."

Work Inspiration

Year 9-12 students

Work Inspiration will help your child explore the real world of work. They are given opportunities to experience the world of work first-hand in a meaningful and inspiring way.

What does Work Inspiration involve?

In this program, your child will gain understanding of themselves, learn more about the roles in organisations and explore different career paths by:

- Going on a school excursion to a business over two days
- Connecting with a chosen business
- Meeting staff and taking part in the activities designed by them

Programs for parents and carers

Saver Plus



Saver Plus is a 10-month financial education support and matched savings program. It's delivered in partnership with ANZ, to help families on a tight budget manage their money and develop long-term saving habits.

Participants receive up to \$500 in matched savings when they complete the program, which can be used for educational costs such as computers and tablets, textbooks, and uniforms.

Who can join Saver Plus?

To join the Saver Plus program, you must:

- Have a Centrelink Health Care or Pensioner Concession Card and an eligible* Centrelink payment
- Be at least 18 years old
- Have some regular income from work*
 (yourself or your partner) including
 casual, part-time, full-time or seasonal
 work or child support
- Have a child at school or attend vocational education yourself

How Saver Plus works

- Goal setting: Set a savings goal with your delegated Savings Coach for your education-related item(s).
- Saving: Open an ANZ Progress Saver account and save regularly over 10 months.
- **3.** Education: Complete our virtual MoneyMinded financial education workshops.
- **4.** Matching: Reach your savings goals and have your savings matched up to \$500.
